I recently came across the following letter while searching through some of our uncalendered material and, remembering your interest in Caesar Lyndon because of his account book, I thought you might be interested to add this to the information you already have concerning him:

"Newport August 10th, 1793

Sir,

I have been confined by sickness in Bed, & one of the uppermost Rooms---however I hope my good Luck will still remain in Lotteries, I pray Mr. Richardson, to choose a Prize Ticket in the present Lottery, called "The Federal City.

Excepting the Prize, of the Superb Hotel, with baths, outhouses & & to cost 50,000 dollars.---But any one of the 8 next Prizes, I should be very glad to share a part of one.

The Great Prize Superb Hotel & &. is a great Mystery to my Shallow Capacity. The fortunate Number, The Keys of the Hotel when complete will be delivered to the fortunate Possessor of the Ticket drawn against its Number. It appears to me that the Hotel will not be complete in a less time than 7 years---Perhaps before the Expiration of that Period, I may be no more, and nearly forgotten, The plan of the Hotel Prize, appears to me very difficult--Pray favour me with 2 dollars worth, or proportionable part of the Prize, with yourself, which I hope, we may be entitled to, & for Mortality sake, write something from under your hand, that may entitle me to the amount of 2 dollars worth, to satisfy your Executors or Administrators if you should do otherwise than well. Also let me have an exact copy of the Ticket, that I shall be a part Owner of--Pray set down the Number of the Ticket in Figures very plain together with the Directors Name--from

The Rhode Island Republican for Feb 9, 1826 gives the following obituary for Mrs. Sarah Lyndon: (which you perhaps already have)

"In this town on Friday the 27th ult. Sarah Lyndon, a venerable and highly respected woman of color, in the 94th year of her age. The deceased had been a servant in the family of the Rev. James Searing, formerly Pastor of the second congregational church in this place, and was the relict of Caesar Lyndon, well known in this town as a man of color of remarkable attainments, having actually officiated as Secretary to his master, the late Governor Lyndon. In her long and respectable life, she uniformly supported the best character for probity, fidelity and attention to her duties, and was one of the few survivors of that old race of domestic servants, which was educated in the excellent school of our fathers, and who were the best models in this or any other country of the estimable qualities we seek, in that class of the community."

I have never come across an account of Caesar's death but if you have that date I should like to add it to our file concerning him.
