**5** John Alfred Hazard (1743c-1794) was the son of Thomas and Mary Easton Hazard. He died of yellow fever on board the frigate General Green where he served as the purser.

**11 Hannah Easton** (1751c-1797) was the daughter of Jonathan Easton. The stone was carved by John Stevens III, the grandson of the John Stevens who established the carving shop in Newport in 1705. This style of effigy is the last style used on slate stones and was only carved by John Stevens III and John Bull.

**12 Rebecca Easton and Stephen Easton** (1759) were the twin children of Jonathan and Ruth, died shortly after they were born as did their mother. The stone carved by John Stevens II bears the quote: Here lies two recent Babes Too soon deny'd The Bossom when they drew the Vital Tide

**13 Jonathan Easton** (1719c-1795) and **Ruth Easton** (1723c-1759), husband and wife, are buried here. Ruth Coggeshall Easton died after giving birth to twins, Rebecca and Stephen. The slate ledger stone on this box tomb was carved by John Bull. Jonathan is the person for whom the site is named. The locations of the graves of his father and grandfather are unknown. His great-grandfather (John Easton) and 2x great-grandfather (Nicholas Easton) are buried in the Coddington Burial Ground. They both served as governors of the colony.

**14 Mary Hazard (**1743-1794) Mary was the wife of Thomas Hazard and the daughter of Jonathan and Ruth Easton. The inscription on her stone is: *"The slow the cruel power of a Disease Has given the kindest of Friends release Rude was the Wound & piercing to the sight When every Earthly Pleasure took its flight."* 

17 Ruth Easton (1760c-1806) was the wife of John Easton. Her stone was carved by John Stevens III, the grandson of the founder of the shop founder.

**19 Jonathan H Easton** (1799c-April 13, 1842) was the 7<sup>th</sup> descendant of Nicholas Easton, an original founder of Newport in 1639. His stone bears the most recent year of death. In 1837 he sold 40 acres of land out of the family that included the gravesite. The right of heirs to the site and the construction of a stone wall were included in the transaction.

**20 Hannah Easton** (1685c-1765) was the wife of Nicholas Easton and her birth year is the oldest on a stone in this site. Her stone was carved by John Stevens II, the oldest son of the Steven's shop founder. John II took over the shop in 1724 for his aging father. John ran the business, looked after his aging parents and younger siblings.

**22 George Easton** (1778c-1784) was the son of Nicholas and Elizabeth Easton. This slate stone was carved by John Bull. It shows a winged effigy of his later designs using large heavy eyes. The side panels are typical of those used by members of the Stevens family.
